The Dead People In My Phone

I am relieved to know that I am not the only person whose phone contains dead people. Quick online searches reveal many who are reluctant to delete the details of those who have died, from their electronic contact lists. I am one of those people.

Seeing those names is an incidental activity. Usually I want to call, message or email someone. As I scroll through names I am reminded of relationships that span decades, including a growing number of those who have departed this

life. Later I'll revisit those memories; the circumstances in which we met, times we've shared together, their death.

From time to time I wonder why I don't delete these contacts. It's not because I'm a terrible administrator (though I am a terrible administrator). It's not because of some phobia. It's because I like them being there. I like these unplanned and random remembrances of friends departed.

Deleting their names would take these encounters away. And it would make them seem to be gone. But they're not really gone.

Jesus recalled that God spoke of the patriarchs Abraham, Isaac and Jacob saying 'I am the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob', not that he 'had been' their God. Jesus believed that God spoke that way because Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, along with all of the faithful, had not departed to non-existence but still existed in relationship with God.

It always makes me a bit sad when I attend funerals of folk who I know believe in a life beyond this one, but those gathered get told the only way they now exist is in memories. That's not the belief that sustained these Christians through life and comforted them as they faced the grave.

I don't keep their contacts in my phone because my memories of these friends are all that exists of them.

I keep them because each contact reminds me to live and die believing that through trust in Jesus who is the resurrection and the life, our lives continue in relationship with God beyond the grave. And each name reminds me that our contact, though interrupted, will one day resume.

2027 Vision — "What it could look like" By 2027, we want to see: *Multiple people being saved! New people coming and feeling at home, growing and joining us as prayerful disciples, as we train godly leaders to multiply gospel ministry.*

At Seacliff we dearly cherish sound Bible teaching, and desire this to lead to spiritual growth. Also necessary for growth is learning together, and from each other, as "disciples" of Jesus, and so involvement in church Growth Groups is very important to us.

On Sunday 18th August we had a special time after the service when these Mission, Vision and Values statements were presented to all the congregation and received positive reception. The next steps to translate this vision into reality involve making strategic plans and taking action.

One of these actions will take the form of a 100th anniversary celebration for the Seacliff Hall, which begins its centennial year this October. We intend to hold a celebration in the new year, with an evangelistic focus, and a special 'looking back, looking forward' day to celebrate and present to the community a 'new look' Seacliff. This will involve much preparation and plans are being prepared for much needed preparation of the property, painting especially and advertising.

Our congregation has welcomed some new people over the past several months and all share in our after-service suppers. Several of the younger members of the congregation have become more involved in the everyday running of the church which has been of blessing to them and to all.

We have established a new children's area in our old office area, with Song Ai Brown taking on the role of Children's ministry coordinator.

As our church has only one local elder the presbytery has approved the establishment of a 'Leadership Team' who will meet regularly with the minister to support the work of the church. This group will work alongside the Session and the Committee of Management.

On the whole, many small steps are taking place to bring the church forward, and there is a firm sense of hope for the future. We pray, and trust, that under God, the gospel will go out from our church into our surrounding community and beyond for many more years.



The Saturday afternoon concert saw 50 attend the big event which also saw my Mum Barbara and Dad Donald cut a cake to celebrate 60 blessed years together.

The following week saw a group of ministers from western Victoria stay over 3 days for a retreat, glowing reviews will hopefully see their church groups book the facility in the future.

Groups just kept on booking for July. This saw 3 more groups to finalise our camp year, the 6th had the new users of the Kingsley SES Cadets from the Port Mac Donnell / Allendale area which will see more usage of the camp as it was perfectly suited for their group.

From the 8-12th we had another new user group Students Explore Australia from the Adelaide area and this will definitely lead to more of their groups heading our way. The 26-28th a small group of ladies from western Victoria enjoyed a weekend of sewing and craft in the front lounge with the fire keeping them warm. They had a wonderful stay also celebrating Christmas in July, decorating the camp and fancy dress to match.

The last week of July saw the long awaited wet areas of the kitchen being pulled out. Looking a bit like a demolition site (photos on the next page), we now have the new plumbing set into the walls which has included getting a sink to the oven end of the room to reduce the risk of dropping boiling pots; cupboard bases have been installed with room for a purchased dishwasher and in the last few days the electrical supply and lighting have been upgraded.

The new stainless bench tops are being manufactured as I type, all of which will truly lift the quality of the facility. Sue Camden: With Christ "The legacy of Bill and Sue's ministry is easy to see."

On Thursday 11th July, at the age of 92, Sue Camden went to be with Christ. Sue and her husband, the Rev Bill Camden, were very well known throughout the Church, particularly as APWM missionaries.

Throughout their 39 years of marriage, Bill and Sue shared the vision of seeing the people of Vanuatu come to know Christ, and then be able to read the Word of God in their heart language. Following the completion of Bill's theological studies, Bill and Sue commenced service in Vanuatu (then known as the New Hebrides) in 1957, where Bill served as a District Missionary for many years. In the

1960's. Bill embarked on one of the most significant ministries of his life as he led a team in the translation of the Bible into Vanuatu's national language, Bislama, Bill worked on this translation until its completion in

1994, not long before he went to be with Christ.

Sue continued ministering to many in Australia in her roles as a mother, a grandmother, a great grandmother, a high school teacher, a Bible Study leader and an ESL teacher at Epping Presbyterian Church. She showed love in many ministries including youth group, visiting children at Allowah Hospital, and supporting ministries in high schools and universities. She opened the Bible in her home to many of all ages, cultures and backgrounds including refugees, migrants and overseas visitors. Sue was a praver warrior, and in her later years when she could no longer talk to people about God, she talked to God about people.

We praise God for raising up Bill and Sue who were committed to spreading the knowledge of God at home and in some of the earth's most remote places.

In the preface to Bill and Sue's biography, 'God Speaks Our Language' their son-in-law, the Rev Dr Ian Smith writes:

"The legacy of Bill and Sue's ministry is easy to see. Today, throughout the islands of Vanuatu, each Lord's Day morning, people hear God's word read and proclaimed in Bislama. Even today, the Bible is the most significant translation work in the national language. In a very real sense, this has united a linguistically diverse people not only around a common language, but also, for most of the population of Vanuatu, around a common belief.

For Bill and Sue, and many missionaries before them, their expectation was that the Gospel would transform not only individuals, but society. This can be seen today in churches, as well as in schools, hospitals, government, and the very fabric of society. Christianity has not replaced traditional culture, it has redeemed it, and those who would argue otherwise would be wise to appreciate this distinction." "Long tingting blong mi, sipos mi mi stap laef, hemia bambae mi stap joen long Kraes, mi stap leftemap nem blong hem, mo sipos mi mi ded, bambae i gud moa." (Philippians 1:21 from the Niutestamen Long Bislama)
