
Book of the Month

O Love That will not let Me Go

| Nancy Guthrie (Editor)

For many modern day Christians, death has become what J. I. Packer terms "the great unmentionable." This attitude denies not only the reality of the human condition, but also the reality of God's promises for believers beyond this life. The church needs to think more about death in the light of the gospel.

This compilation, edited by Nancy Guthrie, includes the writings of twenty-two classic and contemporary theologians and Bible teachers on how to prepare to die in faith. The short meditations are drawn from sermons, books, and other writings of classic



theologians such as Jonathan Edwards and John Calvin, and of leading contemporary communicators such as John Piper, Tim Keller, J. I. Packer, and others. The writers provide a solidly scriptural and countercultural way to view the inevitability of death, explaining how and why believers can face physical death with hope, joy, and confidence in God's promises for the life to come.

Nancy Guthrie teaches the Bible at her home church, Cornerstone Presbyterian Church, in Franklin, Tennessee, USA, speaks at conferences around the USA and internationally. She and her husband, David, are the cohosts of the GriefShare video series used in over 6,000 churches around the country and host Respite Retreats for couples who have faced the death of a child. She is the author of numerous books.

Saved from exploitation, finding freedom and life!

Walking up the stairs to the platform, *Laxmi is careful not to step on the hem of her new sari. She dressed carefully this morning, adding fragrant jasmine flowers to her hair. She couldn't believe this day had arrived!

Until recently, Laxmi and her two children, *Amiya and *Rakesh had barely enough food to eat, her children vulnerable to traffickers. Laxmi herself was the victim of systemic trafficking at the age of just 12. Exploited and abused by any man in her village. Day and night.

But Laxmi met one of our Village Leaders who introduced her to an alternative life, supporting her every step of the way. Providing healthcare, counselling and care, Laxmi was empowered to break free.

Today Laxmi is receiving a government-accredited diploma as a phlebotomist assistant. She studied for six months learning to draw blood from patients, test it, and help make diagnoses to help impoverished patients return to health. Her new skills will support her family, and change the lives of people in her community. People who once exploited her, used her, looked down upon her.

This day is beyond her wildest imagination. And seated in the audience are her proud children. While Laxmi has been studying, thanks to generous sponsors, they have been attending one of our Good Shepherd schools where they receive a quality English medium education.

In 2024, nearly 300 formerly exploited women like Laxmi graduated from our skills training programs. Receiving government-sponsored certificates in garment making, beautician training, computer literacy, and paramedical skills, the smile on their faces expressing their joy.

Additionally, in the 350 villages where we have Village Leaders working, it is now two full years **since we have seen any young girls dedicated into sexual servitude!**We are truly seeing this systemic dedication of vulnerable girls coming to an end, where we have an active presence.

International Women's Day (March 8) provides an opportunity to share the work of our Village Leaders as they rescue and restore exploited women like Laxmi. It is a time we raise funds to ensure this transformative work continues. Just \$250 supports a Village Leader advocating in her village for an entire year, rescuing women and protecting vulnerable girls. People are invited to organise local fundraising events such as clothes swaps, high teas, movie nights, or 101 other ideas, being a champion for these brave women. Join us this March to support Village Leaders helping women like Laxmi to find freedom and have their dignity restored, while ensuring at-risk girls like Amiya are safe from a life of horrific abuse.

Love is in it for Good | David Powlison

In a single phrase, the first two words characterizing love in 1 Corinthians 13:4 — "Love is patient and kind"— can be expressed this way: Love is in it for good.

Love is in it for good: patient. God is committed for as long as it takes, whatever is going on, however slow the process. He bears with us purposefully, intentionally, through all time. In his great patience, he will complete what he has begun, to his glory and our joy.

Love is in it for good: kind. God freely gives every good gift, doing and saying what is helpful, always constructive, always merciful, always generous. He gives more grace. He gives what is needed. In his great kindness, he will complete what he has begun, to our glory and his joy.

God is love, therefore God is patience and God is kindness. And of course, since every promise of God is Yes in the Son of God, this Jesus is patience and is kindness. Love walked among us, taking on flesh, tempted as we are yet without sin, touched with the feeling of our infirmities, dealing gently with the ignorant and wayward.

Such love is a communicable attribute of God. This means that in taking us on—often impatient, often unkind— and making us over into the image of Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit will make us patient and kind. He will teach us to become in-it-for-good with other people, amid the ups, the downs, the vicissitudes, the exigencies. This is the life-long goal of Christian ministry: "love, that issues from a pure heart and a good conscience and a sincere faith" (1 Timothy 1:5).

The fuller Old Testament equivalent to 1 Corinthians 13:4 had already been revealed on Sinai: "The LORD, the LORD, a God merciful and gracious, slow to anger [in the Greek, "patient"], abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness, keeping steadfast love for thousands, forgiving iniquity and transgression and sin." (Exodus 34:6–7a)

He is in it for good with all who take this revelation to heart as God's great gift of himself, as our greatest need, as the goal of our moral transformation. (And this God will justly destroy intransigent iniquity, all that spurns such a gift, denies such a need, refuses such a goal—Exodus 34:7b.)

It is striking that when revealing his glory and goodness, the LORD chooses to show forth communicable attributes. He could have mentioned his omniscience, omnipotence, omnipresence, selfexistence, eternity, things infinitely beyond the creature. But he chose to reveal his mercy, what is within our comprehension, within our experience, within our grasp, by grace. We, too, learn to become merciful and gracious, slow to anger, abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness, forgiving. (And we, too, learn to justly hate what is evil.)

What we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when he appears we shall be like him, because we shall see him as he is. He is in it for good, and so are we.

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As a pastor friend often says, "That'll preach." And, it's worth adding, "That'll counsel," both for would-be helpers and for those in need of help.

Because you hold the keys of death and Hades, Jesus, and to everything else, I don't have to be afraid to die, or to live. You have robbed the grave of its victory, you have removed the sting of death, and you have defeated the devil and all the powers of darkness! I don't have to be afraid of people. I don't have to be afraid of failing. I don't have to be afraid of getting old. Yes, yes, yes!

Place your right hand on me today in the gospel, that I might be freed more fully from my fears and live more fully to the praise of your glorious Name. Amen and Amen forever!

The Rev Christie Balzer, went to be with Christ on Friday the 24th of January after a short battle with cancer. Chris and his late wife Leah, served at the Talua Theological Training Institute in Vanuatu from 2003 to 2004.

Prior to Talua, Chris taught at the Sydney Presbyterian Theological Centre for many years. He was passionately committed to the truth of the gospel and its spread. After the seismic events associated with the 1977 disruption to the Presbyterian Church of Australia, Chris poured his energy into playing his part in the recovery of the Bible within the Presbyterian Church.

Chris once wrote an article about the resurrection of believers and said:

"If we really believed that only those who trust in Christ for their salvation will go to be with him after they die, then we'd be more involved in missionary work abroad. More of us would go ourselves, and more of us would financially support those who do go.

It was for this reason that, in the late 18th century and the first half of the 19th century, thousands of Europeans left the comparative comfort and safety of their homes to preach the gospel in far away places, knowing that many of them would die there and never see their loved ones in Europe again. The men knew that many of their wives would die on the mission field. The women knew that they would bury many of their children there."

Praise God for Christ's resurrection!

"Your investment in souls in Malawi"



We praise God that, at the time of writing, \$120,000 has been donated for APWM's Malawi (Chichewa) Bible project and 5,500 Bibles have been ordered.

Over the last few months, the team from Victoria who will be traveling to Malawi in June, have been undergoing training. [Please note that team members are travelling at their own expense].

Team Leader, the Rev John Wilson from Victoria says: "Over the next two or three mission trips, over 5,500 people from the poorest Malawian villages will be blessed as they read God's Word. For many of these dear Christians, they have never had their own copy of God's Word.

In their family units, small groups and churches, they will be able to read God's Word in their own language and grow in their knowledge of Christ. Thank you for your investment in souls in Malawi. As the members of the Presbyterian Church of Australia, you have raised the standard high, and you've purposed to bless the hearts of over 5,500 of Malawi's poorest with the eternal blessing of the Word of God."

Please note: The Appeal was closed on the 28th of February. Any donation for Bibles for Malawi received after the closing date will be gratefully received and will be used for unforeseen Chichewa Bible distribution needs. Any remaining funds will then be placed in APWM's General Funds to be used for Partner Church causes as decided by the APWM National Committee.

What does it take to distribute Bibles?



What is involved in distributing Bibles in Malawi? Team Leader, the Rev John Wilson explains:

We have a Presbyterian Church of Victoria-based team preparing to go to Malawi from the 24th of June to the 19th of July this year. The team will give three full weeks to distribute Bibles in villages and to train local Christians in the use of their new Bibles. I'm so grateful to God for gathering together 16 talented members (each self-funded) from 9 different Victorian congregations (aged from 20 to 80, 11 men and 5 women). The training and preparation to go is a sixmonth commitment. When we arrive in Malawi we'll divide into 4 groups and, by visiting 2 villages each week, we might be able to distribute 2,000 Bible packages (leaving another 2,000 in the shed).

I already have one expression of interest to form a second mission team planned for June - July 2026.

If the Bibles Appeal continues to flourish, then we'll probably need a third team for 2027. Who will come with me?

I mentioned six-months training and preparation.

This means:

- · Practicing how to meet and greet one another in Chichewa;
- · Learning how to use and teach the COMA method of Bible study;
- Learning how to teach the Bible story overview in small groups;
- Honing what is in our skill-set and giftedness in terms of singing, reading Scripture, children and youth ministry, preaching and women's ministry.
